


SYNOPSIS

On a quiet Kentucky farm in 1955, the Clements family prepares for a typical rural evening — unaware that something otherworldly has landed in the woods beyond their property. When strange lights pulse from the trees and creatures begin to encircle the house, the family finds themselves under siege by forces they can't explain, and no one will believe.

As the night wears on, the Clements fight to protect their home and one another, barricading themselves inside as wave after wave of attacks escalate. With the local police dismissing their calls and the outside world unaware, survival falls entirely on their own courage and resourcefulness.

But as their defenses break down and one of their own is taken, the threat becomes terrifyingly personal — and the true nature of what's hiding beyond the woodline begins to reveal itself.

Beyond the Woodline is a suspenseful, character-driven sci-fi thriller about a family pushed to the edge of belief and endurance. Inspired by actual events, it reimagines the infamous 1955 Hopkinsville encounter as a grounded, emotional survival story — one where the fight for truth is just as fierce as the fight to stay alive.




VISUAL TONES AND COMPARISONS

The film's visual tone evokes the eerie stillness and rural atmosphere of *Signs* and *The Vast of Night*, combined with the emotional authenticity of *A Quiet Place* and the nostalgic lens of *Super 8*. The cinematography leans into natural sources: flickering lanterns, moonlight cutting through windows, and the cold pulses of an alien glow on hardwood floors.

The horror is restrained and suspense-driven, with creatures presented as shadowy silhouettes or fleeting glimpses, heightening tension without overexposure. There's a distinctly 1950s Americana palette and aesthetic, with vintage clothing, furniture, and vehicles enhancing the authenticity of the period setting. The result is a film that feels intimate, timeless, and unsettling — a visual and tonal homage to classic sci-fi grounded in real human emotion.

TARGET AUDIENCE

Beyond the Woodline is designed for audiences who connect with emotionally grounded suspense stories that prioritize human experience over spectacle. This includes viewers who appreciate slow-building tension, rich characterization, and a psychological lens on genre material. The film's historical setting and emotional core make it widely accessible, while its focus on survival and mystery will appeal to fans of smart, mature science-fiction and horror.



CHARACTERS

HANK CLEMENTS

Late 40s. World War II veteran. Rugged, practical, a natural protector. Tries to stay rational even as the world outside defies reason.





AUDREY CLEMENTS

Early 40s. Fiercely maternal, sharp-witted, and composed under pressure. The emotional heart of the family — and deadly with a rifle when pushed.

BOBBY CLEMENTS

Brave, curious, and impulsive. A boy straddling childhood and manhood who ultimately becomes the emotional core of the story's final twist.





EMMA CLEMENTS

Wide-eyed, funny, and fearless. Her innocence offers levity and truth in moments of fear.

TRAVIS CLEMENTS

Older brother. Level-headed. His perspective brings in the outside world beyond the family farmhouse.





OLIVE

Audrey's mother. Tough as nails, with old-school grit and deep instincts.

SETTING / WORLD

1955 rural Kentucky — isolated farmland near the edge of a dense woodline. The world is quiet, analog, and unprepared for what's coming. The isolation enhances the claustrophobia as the family is besieged by impossible intruders — long-limbed, silent, spindly creatures with black eyes and alien intelligence.

The time period is crucial — post-WWII optimism clashes with Cold War paranoia and sci-fi fascination. Radios crackle. Shotguns jam. Phones are dead. The world doesn't believe them — and won't come to help.







WHY NOW?

In a time where truth is often twisted, erased, or ignored, *Beyond The Woodline* tells a deeply human story about a family no one believed — even when they were telling the truth.


The project explores belief, trauma, and memory — while delivering edge-of-your-seat tension and a chilling, unforgettable twist.
