
THE SERIES

Clear Creek Bluffs Homeowner's Association (HOA) is a character-driven, one-hour dramedy series of three seasons, eight episodes each.

In SEASON 1, HOA Members face the Great Financial Collapse caused by currency manipulation that turns their society into an "all-cash economy" overnight. As they struggle to understand its magnitude and cope with its implications, HOA Members draw on each member's talents to form an unlikely but highly effective collective. But as the pressure mounts, their moral compass begins to point further and further away from Magnetic North.

Members hit their stride in **SEASON 2.** They survive, even thrive, in the post-banking economy. They form tighter relationships and create a new sense of meaning and belonging.

SEASON 3 presents the resolution of the Crisis. The banking industry redeemed, society begins to normalize to the dismay of CCB HOA members. They value the cool new groove they've carved out for themselves and intend to maintain it at ANY COST.



THE GREAT FINANCIAL CRISIS

By 2021, billionaire wealth hoarders had grown tired of the everincreasing societal and media scrutiny placed on their activities. The movement towards a new world order of more significant social and economic equity filled them with existential dread.

With fortunes from industries with catastrophic environmental and societal implications, the billionaire wealth hoarders raced to colonize Mars and leave Earth for good. But first, they crashed the economy.

They cashed in their disparate share of financial holdings for nonconventional assets all at once, and the wheels of the conventional banking industry immediately ground to a halt.

Goods and services were scarce in the new "cash only" economy, and people were forced to retool society to meet their basic needs.



THE STORY

We open with the Billionaire Investment Group (BIG) key players planning their departure to their Mars Colony.



Paige watches lift-off from her phone as her credit card is declined in the checkout line at Target. This is the first domino to fall in a series of financially-driven calamities resulting from the Crisis.

Lack of access to money throws society into a tailspin, and people become increasingly desperate. By the end of the pilot, they lose the basics: internet, electricity, cell service, and schools close.

Paige and her neighbors unite with a common purpose of maintaining their families, supporting each other, and protecting their families, homes, and community.

They form a neighborhood collective to protect themselves from interlopers, barter for goods and services, and provide for societal needs like medical care and education. Each HOA member brings unique skills to the game. It's a weird mix, but it works.

13 and still sweet enough to be loveable, Bowen frequently finds himself drawn into Paige and Phillip's post-marital discord.


Realtor and the HOA president, Rae Lynn Bak
