## Adam&Eve – The Original Couple – Season 1

- Pseudo documentary/mockumentary
- Comedy
- Single camera
- 20 min.

The world's first reality show, from when there were only two people on the planet. The first boy ever meets the first girl ever.

Season outline – 10 episodes:

### Episode 1 - 'Pilot'

We get to know Adam, Eve, and Monty (the snake), and the style of this show. In a stylistic sense, we're basically watching Parks&Recreation set in the dawn of time.

We learn Monty is not up to all good. Adam and Eve go on their first date, which is a disaster. We cut right to it, both have been eating from the forbidden tree, and are now scared they might get into trouble. A slight oversight on Monty's behalf, as he somehow forgot to mention the only rule in paradise: "Don't eat from the tree".

It is strongly hinted 'dad' is onto them and angry.

Their relationship doesn't look all rosy for now.

## **Episode 2 – 'Playing it Cool'**

They are not talking to each other. Adam's plan is to cold shoulder her, but it's clearly the wrong way to go. Eve wants to be acknowledged, taken into consideration, and is getting the exact opposite from Adam.

Eve is disappointed, and focuses on other stuff, such as taking care of animals. Interestingly many small cuddly animals keep disappearing, especially when Monty is around (?)

Adam goes off to venture Eden, and discovers a new, breathtakingly beautiful orchard, full of fruit trees of all sorts.

He goes to Eve since he can't handle this new information by himself, and the new discovery makes them forget their feuding for now. All trees are labeled as something (Tree of Moral, Tree of Wisdom, Tree of Remorse), but they don't know what, since they can't read. Eating from those trees gives them new insight, which helps in building the relationship. But paradoxically, this makes 'dad' angrier all the time.

Confessionals reveal we are moving in a better direction relationship-wise. Not quite there yet, but a move for the better nonetheless.

#### Episode 3 – 'Read the Room'

Monty teaches Adam and Eve to read – It is revealed Monty has all sorts of knowledge he shouldn't have, such as alphabets (that should not be introduced to humans for thousands of years), some stuff about God's plans, etc.

Learning to read proves to be easy if you have eaten from the Tree of Knowledge – The new skill is a two-edged sword, it feels like God is testing them, setting traps, such as a sign saying "DANGER". If they avoid the danger, they basically admit having eaten from the tree.

Relationship-wise, no progress.

#### **Episode 4 - 'Trading places'**

To find out which one of them has a harder job, they pull a classic, actually switch roles for a day. Turns out, Adam's role in the grand scheme of things is way easier. In reversed roles, Adam keeps the home cave clean, cooks, learns about reproduction, raising babies, and maintenance of the female body for starters. Eve now mainly takes naps, and fishes without a bait. The new-found admiration for Eve makes Adam apologize. Eve also realizes Adam is not entirely useless, as Adam has secretly been trying to build things, and come up with inventions. Adam has a secret place for this, a private work-shop.

Relationship-wise, a step toward better.

# Episode 5 - 'Tying the knot'

Adam pops the question. The word is not 'marry', but he makes it clear he wants to spend the rest of his life with Eve. He always found this to be obvious, but Eve needed to hear it. Adam invents a symbol, a circular object that is placed on each of their fingers, stating they are now tied to one another. Eve likes it. They are about to have a ceremony, a party to celebrate this, as Adam makes an unfortunate comment about the female species not being able to cope on their own. The ceremony is canceled fortwith.

Relationship-wise, a huge step back.

## Episode 6 – 'Battle of the Sexes'

Adam's dumb comment sparks up, not only an argument, but a full-out sport event. Ten trials of endurance, wits, and skill will determine which is the better sex. Both of them choose trials where they are supposed to shine, and ironically both lose at those very trials. Be it a fluke or some other twist of fate, they both do well in areas where they are not supposed to. Spoiler: It's a tie.

Relationship-wise, back to neutral.

#### Episode 7 – 'Tomatoes, schomatoes'

The race is done, and their relationship is lukewarm at best.

They both want to take a step towards better, but are both too proud.

Monty realizes, should Adam and Eve fail in their mission, he will become useless to God too. It is also hinted, he kind of misses these two together. Monty delivers their greetings to one another, and often lies to make them sound better. He's up to some good for a change, even if his motives are mostly selfish.

We learn Eve has written a ton of undelivered letters to Adam, and he is taken aback reading them. He's also ashamed upon realizing how little he has done to try and fix things between them.

In the end, Eve notices Adam has left her the ultimate gift – He has formed a large heart on the ground out of glow worms. This looks breathtaking in the dusk, and it does melt Eve's heart. She invites him in.

Relationship-wise, score.

## Episode 8 – 'King of the world'

Adam is a happy camper. And so is Eve, but in a different way. Whereas Adam wants to declare from the mountaintops he is the only man who 'has ever done it with every woman on the planet', Eve is designing her dream home and is looking for assurance that their relationship is on the right path.

They are essentially looking for the perfect spot to build their perfect home. It hits home for Adam, this means a lot of work for him.

Monty warns them, 'dad' is seriously looking for evidence on fruit thievery. Adam doesn't care, he's on top of the world. Eve also feels they have nothing to worry about, as long as they are fulfilling their mission.

## Episode 9 - 'Busted'

Things have reached the point, where Adam has built a shopping cart, in which he wheels home all the various forbidden fruit. I.e. they are not worried at all. They create new dishes based on fruit, and even play restaurant, serving one another in turns. The meals and desserts have somewhat offensive names, like 'Forbidden delight', and 'Blasphemé Déluxe'.

To showcase just how carefree they are at this point, the episode starts to look like a reality show, where a famous chef (Monty) comes to criticize how they should be running their restaurant. This could be a fun distraction for the viewer, as we get immersed in that format.

The final straw is Adam's new dish 'sinful&smoking', which sends an alluring smoky fruit flavour to the skies. The smoke stirs up something up there, and finally the sky erupts in thunder, lightning and tornado. Adam and Eve have never seen anything like that in paradise, they run and hide in their cave.

# Episode 10 – 'The Trial for All Humanity'

The sky finally clears and all looks peaceful. Adam immediately retorts to his old self, full of optimism and unwarranted confidence. Until Monty delivers a letter to them, saying "You have been served". It's a subpoena.

As the title suggests, this is a courtroom episode that will determine their future. The entire court is composed of various animals granted the gift of speech for the duration of the trial. All witnesses, and few of them have anything good to say. The animals talk about the humans exploiting everything they can and leaving a mess behind.

Monty serves as the defense attorney, and is even doing a half decent job at it. He truly gets serious upon finding out he too will get kicked out of Eden, should they lose.

Throughout the episode, and during confessionals Adam and Eve strengthten their bond, they work together as a team, defending one another. They hold hands as the verdict is revealed – guilty. And we all know how it ends - They finally get kicked out of paradise together, immediately.

The episode, and the season ends with Adam and Eve (and Monty) standing in a dark, scary forest. It starts to rain.

Needless to say, this is not the end, but a good place to pick up speed. Season two will be wild and full of surprises.
