
Second Chances

Logline & Synopsis

Logline: A year after the tragic loss of his wife, the owner of Chicago's last video rental store must navigate the bittersweet journey of reopening his heart to love in a world that has moved on from the past.

Synopsis: Second Chances opens in Chicago, where Ethan Cross, 45, and his pregnant wife, Danielle, shop for their future baby. Ethan's humorous paranoia about Danielle's pregnancy sets a light tone, but subtle concern about their upcoming ultrasound looms. Their loving bond is further explored during a tender moment in the parking lot as they load their SUV.

At Ethan's struggling video rental store, we meet Sylvester "Brick" Brykowski, an aspiring screenwriter, and Luke, Ethan's best friend and accountant. Luke suggests an exit strategy, but Ethan, emotionally attached to the store, resists. The store's history includes ties to Chicago mayors and mob-related murders, which Ethan shares with YouTubers.

At home, Ethan and Danielle's playful banter deepens their connection, while a dinner conversation highlights Danielle's quirky pregnancy cravings. However, tragedy strikes when Danielle and their unborn child are killed in a car accident. A year later, Ethan is still grieving, his life in disarray, and he's clinging to Danielle's memory. Financially strained, he reluctantly processes a refund for unused baby items.

Ethan begins to let go, cleaning his fridge and accepting advice from Harold, a local restaurant owner. Luke sets Ethan up on a dinner date to help him move on. Meanwhile, Ethan's interactions with Brick, his ex Kelly, and real estate investor James Brighton reveal his internal conflict over the store's future. As the store's financial troubles deepen, Ethan faces costly city-mandated renovations.

Ethan's relationship with Kelly rekindles, leading to an almost kiss, but he abruptly leaves, still conflicted. His budding romance with Cindy, a potential new love interest, progresses, though Ethan remains emotionally tied to the past. Luke continues to push Ethan toward practicality, suggesting he sell the store. Ethan's first sexual encounter post-Danielle is fraught with emotional complexity.

Brick's script finds success on the Blacklist, providing a glimmer of hope. Despite Ethan's efforts to save the store through crowdfunding, its financial problems persist. He receives a \$3.25 million offer from James to buy the store, a tempting solution to his troubles. As Ethan contemplates the offer, Harold's death symbolizes the end of an era, and city inspectors demand \$750,000 in repairs or closure.

Ethan's growing romance with Cindy helps him begin to move forward, choosing her over rekindling things with Kelly. He also presents Brick with a check to produce his movie, supporting his friend's dream. The story ends with Ethan and Cindy in a tender moment, leaving their future and Brick's movie uncertain.




Purpose

Thematic Elements



"Legacy vs. Progress": The film explores the tension between holding onto the past and embracing the future, embodied in Ethan's attachment to his video rental store and the pressure to sell it for financial stability.

"Pathways of Grief": Ethan's journey illustrates the various stages of grief and the search for meaning after a devastating loss. His interactions with Danielle's memory, his reluctance to move on, and his eventual steps towards healing reflect this theme.

"Rekindling Old Flames": The re-emergence of Kelly in Ethan's life and their complex past relationship highlights the theme of revisiting old connections and the potential for rekindling or closure.

"The Power of Support": Throughout Ethan's struggles, the support from his friends Luke and Brick, as well as his developing relationship with Cindy, demonstrate the importance of community and companionship in overcoming life's challenges.

"Embracing Change": Ethan's eventual willingness to consider new opportunities, both in his personal life with Cindy and professionally by supporting Brick's filmmaking dream, underscores the theme of adaptability and the courage to embrace change.



Ethan Cross

(Casting Idea: A Tom Hanks type)

A tall, handsome, and slightly dorkish 45-year-old video store owner, Ethan is emotionally invested in his past, particularly the store and his late wife, Danielle. Throughout the film, he evolves from a man paralyzed by grief to one who begins to embrace change and new possibilities. His character arc is reminiscent of Tom Hanks' character in "You've Got Mail," transitioning from resistance to acceptance of change.



Sylvester "Brick" Brykowski

(Casting Idea: A Finn Wolfhard type)

A film school student and aspiring screenwriter, Brick is passionate about movies and is working on his screenplay. He is a source of youthful energy and ambition, contrasting with Ethan's initial stagnation. His character development is akin to Matt Damon's Will Hunting in "Good Will Hunting," with untapped potential waiting to be realized.



Harold

(Casting Idea: A Richard Kind type)

Harold is a 75-year-old wing restaurant owner with white hair and a beard. He is tall and carries a wealth of experience and nostalgia. He is extroverted and confident, often sharing life lessons and advice with others. Harold is deeply connected to his family and hopes to leave a legacy through his son's business endeavors. He reflects on the past and the changes in his life, often using humor to cope with his experiences.

Kelly & Cindy

(Casting Idea: A Kate Winslet and Sandra Bullock type, respectively)

The women of Ethan's life.

Ethan's ex-girlfriend, Kelly, is complex and carries a mix of resentment and vulnerability. She reconnects with Ethan, revealing a caring side and a shared history that complicates Ethan's emotional landscape. Her character has shades of Kate Winslet's Clementine in "Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind," with a fiery past and a nuanced present.

A potential new romantic interest for Ethan, Cindy is empathetic and shares common interests with him. She represents a new chapter and the possibility of love after loss. Her character is reminiscent of Sandra Bullock's Lucy in "While You Were Sleeping," offering a chance at unexpected love.





Distribution & Budget

Second Chances is a great movie for streaming services such as Hulu and Netflix where the film would be accessible to a range of audiences and take advantage of the long-tail and data-driven recommendations on the platforms. With the right cast it could be potentially very desirable as a theatrical release, as well.
